

John Smithin & Harriet Harris – descendants (Stoulton)

Updated – March 2016

This document describes the descendants of Benjamin Smithin (1791-1853) and Elizabeth Woodward. This part covers the descendants of their son John Smithin (1828-1867)

See separate document for the descendants of their sons Benjamin and Joseph.

There is only very limited information about those born after 1920. Most of the information is from public sources.

Descendants of Benjamin and Elizabeth's son John (b.1828)

John Smithin (1828-1867). The son of Benjamin Smithin and Elizabeth Woodward. He was christened on the 13th April 1828 in Stoulton.¹ His brother Joseph was his twin

At the 1841 census, age 10, he was living at home in Wadborough. The age was approximate in 1841.

John married Harriet Harris (1821-1902) at St. Andrew's Worcester on the 22nd December 1846. The witnesses were Thomas Harris a farmer and Mary Ann Harris.^{2 3} These were probably her parents; Thomas Harris (b.1775) and Mary Andrews (b.1781).

Harriet was christened in Pirton on the 15th July 1821.⁴ There is a family bible with details of some of the family and this includes Mary Ann Harris born on October 14th 1813; she was Harriet's sister.⁵

A son Henry was born in 1847.

A son Benjamin was born in 1848.

A daughter Margaret was born in 1850.

John is listed in Kelly's directory for Worcestershire of 1850.⁶

Smithing John, farmer, Woodcote

At the 1851 census John and Harriet were farming near Bromsgrove.⁷

Margate Smithin, Daughter, age 1, born Bromsgrove

Sarah Howard, Servant, unmarried, age 15, born Bromsgrove

Henry Sorville, Servant, unmarried, age 12, Farm labourer, born Rushcock

John left the farm for another one, probably later in 1851.⁸

Worcester Journal, Thursday 17th July 1851

Farm to be let

An improvable arable farm, situated at Woodcote Green, Bromsgrove, now in the occupation of Mr. John Smithin, containing about 112 acres, of which only 21 acres are Pasture and Meadow Land, with Farm House and Buildings thereon. A considerable portion of the land has been recently drained, and an industrious tenant would be liberally met in making further desirable improvements. The present occupier will shew the Farm; and for terms of tenancy apply to Mr. Wm. Woodward, of Bredon's Norton, near Tewkesbury.

A daughter Olive was born in 1852

A son John was born in 1854.

John senior was mentioned in the Will of his father Benjamin who died in 1861.⁹

John was listed in a trade directory as a farmer at Fibden Farm in 1860.¹⁰

At the 1861 census John and Harriet were farming at Hampton Lovett.¹¹

John Smithin, Head, married, age 34, Farmer of 300 acres employing 7 labourers and 3 boys, born Pershore

Harriet Smithin, Wife, married, age 39, Farmer's wife, born Pershore

Henry Smithin, Son, unmarried, age 14, Scholar, born Pershore

John Alfred Smithin, Son, age 6, born Eastnor, Herefordshire

John Fryer, Servant, age 42, unmarried, Carter, born Eastnor, Herefordshire

Anne Groves, Servant, age 20, unmarried, House servant, born Pershore

The two girls were at boarding school in Stoulton and Benjamin was staying with his uncle Edward Harris in Wadborough.

In about 1862 John was taken ill and gave his brothers control over his farm to carry on his business. A legal document was drawn up on the 2nd December 1862 and signed by all three brothers.¹²

Whereas the said John Smithin being unable from ill health properly to manage and attend to his Farming business and being desirous of making some provisions for his wife Harriet Smithin and her children hath proposed and agreed to assign to the said Benjamin Smithin and Joseph Smithin his furniture, farming stock and other his personal effects

John died, aged 38, in 1867; registered at Droitwich in the March quarter.¹³

Their son Benjamin also died in 1867.

At the 1871 census Harriet was still farming at Hampton Lovett.¹⁴

John Alfred Smithin, Son, unmarried, age 16, Farmer's son, born Ledbury Herefordshire

Eliza Godfrey, Servant, unmarried, age 17, General servant domestic, born Droitwich

David Evans, Servant, unmarried, age 40, Farm servant indoor, born Bredon Norton, Gloucestershire

Harriet was listed in a trade directory as the Farmer at Fibden farm.¹⁵

In 1877 John was referred to as the 'late John Smithin of Fibden'.

At the 1881 census John's wife Harriet was described as a Widow, aged 61, and she was staying with her brother Edward Harris in Pershore.

Harriet Smithen, Sister, widow, age 61, Holy Cross, Worcester

At the 1881 census a Mary Harris, age 72, and family were farming at Abbotswood Farm in Wadborough; possibly the wife of Harriet's older brother Edward.

At the 1891 census Harriet was still living at Abbotswood farm.

Ann Harris, Head, Single, age 70, Farmer, born Pershore Holy Cross
Harriet Smithin, Sister, Widow, age 66, Living on own means, born Pershore Holy Cross
Elizabeth Yeomans, Servant, Widow, age 43, servant domestic, born Hereford, Street Court

Harriet's age should be 71.

At the 1901 census, age 79, Harriet was living in Eckington with her son John and his family.

Harriet died, aged 80, on the 27th May 1902; registered at Pershore. She was living with her son John Alfred in Eckington. Probate was granted to John Alfred Smithin farmer's agent (her son) and William George Andrews, farmer. Her effects were valued at £78 9s 5d.¹⁶

Henry Smithin (1847-1902). The son of John and Harriet. Henry was born on the 17th January 1847 and christened at Pershore, Holy Cross on the 5th February 1847; registered at Pershore in the March quarter.^{17 18 19}

At the 1851 census he was at home in Bromsgrove.

At the 1861 census he was at home at Fibden Farm, Droitwich.

In 1867 Henry was given a family bible by his Aunt Mary Ann Harris. The bible front cover reads: 'Mary Ann Harris, Abbots Wood 1846'. The inscription reads.²⁰

In 1869 Henry was appointed as an Overseer for Hampton Lovett Parish.²¹

Droitwich. Parish Appointments.
Hampton Lovett. J.C. Jackson and Henry Smithin o.;

He was appointed as overseer again in 1870.²²

At the 1871 census he was running Fibden farm with his mother Harriet.

He was still at the farm in 1873.²³

Henry was involved in a court case in 1874.²⁴

Joseph Farmer, labourer, Henry Smithen, farmer, were summoned by P.C. Bough for being drunk and riotous at Catnal Green on the 9th ult. Farmer was fined 10s. and 16s. costs, and Smithen £2 and the like sum for costs, which was paid.

Henry married Louisa Hooper (1858-1887) on the 22nd May 1878 at Pershore Holy Cross.²⁵ Louisa was born on the 22nd February 1858 and christened on the 21st March 1858 in Stoulton.^{26 27} Her parents were Thomas Hooper and Emma Corbett.²⁸ Thomas and Emma were married at Hartlebury, Worcestershire on the 29th March 1857.²⁹ There were other Hooper families living in Wadborough; possibly relatives of Louisa.

Henry was involved in a court case in September 1876.³⁰

Petty Sessions Tuesday

W Walford was charged with being in pursuit of rabbits on land in the occupation of Edward Harris, at Pershore, on the 4th instant. Henry Smithin, nephew of Mr. Harris, said: I saw defendant beating a field with two terrier dogs, and when spoken to he wanted to fight me. There are rabbits in the field and no footpath. Defendant denied that he was in the field at all, but said his brother was. The Bench thought the evidence sufficient to convict, and fined defendant 20s., with 9s. 6d. costs.

A daughter Louisa Margaret was born in 1880 but died the same year.³¹

At the 1881 census Henry and Louisa were living at Norton by Kempsey.³²

A son Henry was born in 1882.

Henry was described as a Farm Bailiff at Cook's Home farm when his son Henry was born in 1882.³³

There is a picture of Louisa with son Henry (as a baby) taken in Bromsgrove in about 1884. Henry remembered being taken in to see his mother when she was ill; this must have been about 1886. We think that Louisa suffered from diabetes.

A daughter Emma was born in 1884.³⁴

Henry was attacked by one of the farm workers in March 1884.³⁵

Worcestershire Chronicle Saturday 8th March 1884

Pershore. Violent Assault on a Farm Bailiff

Arthur Stanton, brought up by warrant, was charged with assaulting Henry Smithin, at Birlingham, on the 27th September 1883. Complainant is farm bailiff to Miss Harris, and on the day in question had occasion to reprove the defendant about his work, whereupon defendant struck him in the face with his fist, knocked him down, and severely kicked him while on the ground. In consequence of the injuries received, complainant was under medical treatment for a fortnight. Defendant absconded immediately, and had escaped the police ever since. Martin Bevan and William Broomfield corroborated, and the Bench considering the assault most unjustifiable and quite unprovoked, sentenced defendant to two months' hard labour without the option of a fine.

A daughter Ellen was born in 1886; she died only 2 hours old.

Henry's wife Louisa died in 1887.

Henry moved to Birmingham and was involved in a court case in October 1890.³⁶

Theft at Selly Oak

Sarah Ashbourne (35) was indicted for stealing two sheets, two toiler-covers, and a tablecloth, belonging to Henry Smithin, at Selly Oak, on the 5th April; also with stealing other similar articles, on the 9th April and the 2nd May, belonging to Henry Smithin. Mr. Harrison prosecuted. Prosecutor went to lodge at the house of the prisoner in March. He had a chest containing the articles mentioned, and gave the woman the key to keep for him. He missed the articles, and subsequently saw twenty eight bundles of clothing belonging to him in Mrs. Wilkinson's pawnshop, at Selly Oak. Evidence was given showing that the prisoner had regularly taken pledges to the shop. Prisoner's defence was that she did not intend to rob the prosecutor. She pledged the articles intending to redeem them, but did not get the chance of doing so. The jury found her guilty. Her husband was

called, and said he could not live her, and asked the Court to give a separation order. He assured the court that he knew nothing of the theft. Prisoner was sentenced to six months' hard labour.

Pledging Stolen Property

Sarah Ashbourne (35), married woman, was charged with having on 5th April and other dates stolen sheets, blankets, curtains, and other goods, the property of Henry Smithin, a man who lodged in her house. Mr. Harrington prosecuted.

The prosecutor had a chest containing the goods, and he entrusted the key to the prisoner, Being in poor circumstances, the woman at several times took articles from the chest and pawned them. She did not represent to the pawnbroker, Mr. Wilkinson, of High Street, Selly Oak, they were hers, but said she had permission from Smithin to pawn them to pay a debt. The woman said she had not intention to steal the goods, and would have returned them when she got the money to redeem them. She told the pawnbroker the day before her arrest that she was going to redeem some of them, but she did not do so, having no opportunity. She was found guilty and sentenced to imprisonment for six weeks, without hard labour, her condition being delicate.

The prosecutor applied for an order that his goods should be returned to him.

Mr. Wilkinson asked that the usual for compensation to the pawnbroker should be made. He said he had given every assistance to the police, and it would be unfair that he should lose his money. The Chairman ordered the goods to be given up, but declined to order compensation to the pawnbroker.

By the 1891 census Henry had moved to Harborne (Birmingham) and was lodging with a family named Hall.

John Ashworth, lodger, age, 48, married, bricklayer's labourer, Rochdale, Lancashire

Mary Downing, lodger, age, 32, single, general servant domestic, Edgbaston, Warwickshire

His son Henry was in Wadborough staying with his Hooper grandparents.

Henry started a Furniture removal business in Birmingham; before 1896. This was listed in Kelly's Directory for 1898.³⁷

Henry Smithin & Son, Furniture removers and landscape gardeners, 48 Hubert Road, Selly Oak

Henry married a second time to Annie Coldicote on the 21st July 1896, at Selly Oak parish church; registered at King's Norton in the September quarter.^{38 39}

Henry was described as a widower, age 49, a Furniture remover. He was living at 48 Hubert Road. Annie was described as a spinster, age 21, living at 28 Hubert Road. Her father was William Coldicote as Tube-tuber. The witnesses were: Thomas Cooper and Emma Cooper.

Annie died in 1900; registered at King's Norton in the June quarter.⁴⁰

Henry later had a serious accident and was looked after by his son. At the 1901 census Henry, aged 54, a widower, was listed as a patient at the King's Norton Union Infirmary. His profession as given as a Labourer.⁴¹

The infirmary built in 1897 was part of the King's Norton Workhouse; the site was occupied Selly Oak Hospital.

Henry died in 1902; registered at King's Norton in the March quarter.⁴²

Henry and Louisa had four children.

Louisa Smithin (1879-1880). Louisa Margaret. The daughter of Henry and Louisa. She was born on the 31st August 1879.^{43 44} She died less than 1 year old; registered at Pershore in the March quarter.⁴⁵

Henry Smithin (1882-1981). Henry Edward. The son of Henry and Louisa. He was born at Cook's Home farm, Stoulton on the 4th June 1882; registered at Pershore in the September quarter.^{46 47 48}

His mother Louisa died in 1887 when Henry was only 5 years old and he remembered being brought up mainly by his grandmother Harriet. She paid for his schooling at two (old) pence per week.

At the 1891 census Henry was staying with his Hooper Grandparents at Abbots Wood Cottage in Wadborough; next to Abbots Wood farm where his grandmother Harriet Smithin was living with her brother.⁴⁹

Henry's father was lodging in Birmingham.

Henry left school, aged 9, having passed his School certificate. He remembers seeing a demonstration of a steam threshing machine which the family were the first to use; both his Great uncle Edward Harris and Great Aunt Elizabeth Smithin were still farming in Wadborough.

When he first left school he went to London to work for an Uncle (possibly a Hooper relative) who was a shoemaker but Henry did not enjoy it and came back to Birmingham.⁵⁰

As a young man, around 1900, Henry remembered working for Joseph Chamberlain in an Engineering factory in Birmingham (possibly Nettleford's Screw factory). Once after a very long shift he took a short break for a cigarette and was fined one shilling by Neville Chamberlain (the future Prime Minister!).

At the 1901 census Henry was boarding with the Turland family at 44 Hubert Road, Selly Oak, Birmingham.

Henry later worked with his father in his Furniture removal business.

Henry had always wanted to be a soldier and joined the Worcestershire Regiment after his father died in about 1902. He served mostly in India and was put on Reserve just before the First World War.

He may have been in India in 1911 as he is listed as 'Overseas Military' on the 1911 census.⁵¹

In 1914 Henry was posted to France with the British Expeditionary Force. He had the rank of Private.

This may have been with the 2nd Battalion who returned from India in 1913 and were posted to France as part of the British Expeditionary force in August 1914. The battalion was involved at Mons (24 August 1914) and at the Battle of Gheluvelt (near Ypres) at the end of October 1914.

At some point Henry was wounded. The story goes that when he came round on the battlefield he found that all his colleagues had been killed and a German soldier was standing over him who just pointed his rifle towards the British lines.

His medal card was as follows.⁵²

Henry was awarded the Silver War badge. This was issued to those who were injured in service between 1914-1919. He also received the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

Henry had a shattered arm and convalesced in Portsmouth and later went back to Birmingham and he remembered that the returning soldiers were very warmly received. He became the first Englishman to receive a bone graft but this was not successful; he later had a further graft and regained the use of his arm.⁵³

Henry married Edith E Morris in 1915; registered at King's Norton in the March quarter.⁵⁴

Henry and Edith moved to Leeds in 1917. They had eight children.

In 1939 they were at Park View Road, Leeds.⁵⁵

Henry's wife Edith Morris died in Leeds in 1973 at the age of 82. Henry died, aged 99, in 1981; registered at Leeds in the June quarter.⁵⁶

Henry and Edith had several children.

Dorothy Smithin (1915-1999). Dorothy Marie. The daughter of Henry and Edith. She was born on the 17th November 1915; registered at King's Norton in the December quarter.⁵⁷

She was listed on an Electoral roll at 44 Temple Avenue, Rothwell in 1937.⁵⁸

Dorothy married Laurie Warrener in 1946; registered at Chatham in the March quarter.^{59 60}

Dorothy died in 1999; registered at Leeds in April.⁶¹

Beatrice Smithin (1917-1996). Beatrice May. The daughter of Henry and Edith. She was born on the 23rd January 1917; registered at Hunslet in the March quarter.⁶²

Beatrice married Austin Lord in 1946.⁶³ They had a daughter Patricia Ann Lord who married Kevan Knowles.

Beatrice died in 1996; registered at Leeds in October.

Muriel Smithin (b.1918). Muriel Ivy. The daughter of Henry and Edith. She was born on the 1st June 1918.⁶⁴

Muriel married Frank Laycock in 1957; registered at Leeds in 1957.⁶⁵

Gwendoline Smithin (1919-2000). Gwendoline Mary. The daughter of Henry and Edith. She was born on the 3rd December 1919.⁶⁶

Gwendoline died, age 80, in 2000; registered at Leeds in May.

Henry Smithin (1922-2004). Henry Edmund. The son of Henry and Edith. He was born on the 26th June 1922.⁶⁷

Henry was listed on an Electoral roll from 1921-1935, at 9 Plevna Street, Rothwell and then at 44 Temple Avenue, Rothwell for 1936 and 1937.⁶⁸

Henry married Joyce Glover in 1949; registered at Leeds in the September quarter.^{69 70}

Henry died in 2004; registered at Leeds in June.

Henry and Joyce had two children. Linda (1949-1998)^{71 72} and Nicola (c.1950).

Jessie Smithin (b.1928). Jessie Elizabeth. The daughter of Henry and Edith. She was born on the 8th December 1928.^{73 74}

James Smithin (b.1930). James Eric. The son of Henry and Edith. He was born on the 22nd March 1930; registered at Wakefield in the June quarter.^{75 76}

Frederick Smithin (1931-2002). Frederick George. The son of Henry and Edith. He was born on the 6th July 1931.^{77 78}

Frederick married Iris Hird in 1954; registered at Leeds in the September quarter. They were later divorced. Iris later married Norman Brook.⁷⁹

Frederick died on the 24th October 2002.

Emma Smithin (1884-1967). Emma Louisa. The daughter of Henry and Louisa. She was born on the 25th August 1884; registered at Pershore in the December quarter.^{80 81}

At the 1891 census, aged 6, she was living in Aston, Birmingham with her aunt Margaret Smithin. Her father was lodging in Birmingham and her brother was staying with their Hooper grandparents in Wadborough.⁸²

Emma moved to Nottingham in about 1900, aged 16/17, and took up a position in service in the West Bridgford area in the south of the city.

At the 1911 census she was living in the West Bridgford district of Nottingham.⁸³

Emma L Smithin, Servant, age 26, single, General servant (domestic), born Kempsey, Worcs.

Emma was living in the Bulwell district of Nottingham by about 1912 where she met and married Issac Harvey a Colliery timberer, in 1917.⁸⁴ They had three children Cyril, William, and Annie.

Annie married Frank Holford in 1944 and they have four children; Michael, Barry, Ivan and Kevin.

Annie remembers her mother taking her to Castle Donnington as a small child to visit a Harvey Hooper who she thinks may have been an uncle.⁸⁵

Emma died, aged 83, on the 6th March 1967.⁸⁶

Ellen Smithin. (bd.1886). The daughter of Henry and Louisa. She was born on the 30th September 1886; registered at Upton.^{87 88} She died only 2 hours old of 'General debility'; registered on the 2nd October. Her father Henry was present at the death.^{89 90}

Benjamin Smithin (1848-1867). The son of John and Harriet. He was christened at Pirton on the 4th July 1848.^{91 92}

At the 1851 census, age 2, he was at home at Bromsgrove.

At the 1861 census, age 12, he was with his uncle in Wadborough.⁹³

Benjamin died, aged 18, on the 29th January 1867 in a shooting accident at Fibden farm; registered at Pershore in the March quarter.^{94 95} The cause of death was 'accidental gunshot wound of the chest, 5 days'. Thomas Hooper was present at the death which was registered on the 31st January.⁹⁶ Thomas Hooper may have been his uncle.

There is a memorial in Stoulton churchyard.

Margaret Smithin (1850-1893). The daughter of John and Harriet. She was christened on the 17th February 1850 at Chaddesley Corbett.^{97 98}

At the 1851 census, age 1, she was at home in Bromsgrove.

John Smithin, a farmer, of Eckington, was summoned by Geo. Gardner, officer of the Cheltenham Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, for allowing a horse and mare to be worked whilst in an unfit state, on the 12th September. The case was clearly proved by a constable, who saw the horse, and by a carter named Collard, in the employ of the defendant, who was called and examined by the Society's officer. He stated that he had told his master that the horses were unfit for work, but his master had ordered him to continue working them. The Bench said that it was a most disgraceful case, and they fined the defendant £3, with 26s. 6d. expenses, or one month's imprisonment, with hard labour. The money was paid.

A daughter Annie was born in 1878.

Richardson, a chauffeur, of Longhope, estimated at £150, resulted from a collision between him and a car driven by Benjamin John Smithin, of 20 The Avenue, West Wickham, Kent, at the New Bridge, Evesham on May 8th. Smithin was fined £4 and ordered to pay £3 5s. costs for failing to comply with traffic signals. In a letter to the Bench, Smithin explained that he was a stranger and did not notice the signals as he was following a large lorry.

Ben was a well known grower of African Violets and won many awards, including those at R.H.S annual shows in 1960 and 1964.^{143 144}

In the Saint-paulia and Houseplant Society's Show held in conjunction with the R.H.S Show the leading prizewinners were. B J Smithin of West Wickham, Kent who won the novices class for a single-flowered saint-paulia.

The Saintpaulia and Houseplant Society held a small competition in connexion with the R.H.S show. The outstanding prizewinner was Mr B J Smithin, West Wickham.

Ben was also a Bowls enthusiast and played at competition level. He was captain of his local club and later Vice President of the Beckenham, Bromley and District Bowling Association.

Ben collapsed and died whilst watching a match at the Temple Bowling Club in Dulwich in 1966. He was aged 84 and his death was registered at Lambeth in the September quarter 1966.^{145 146}

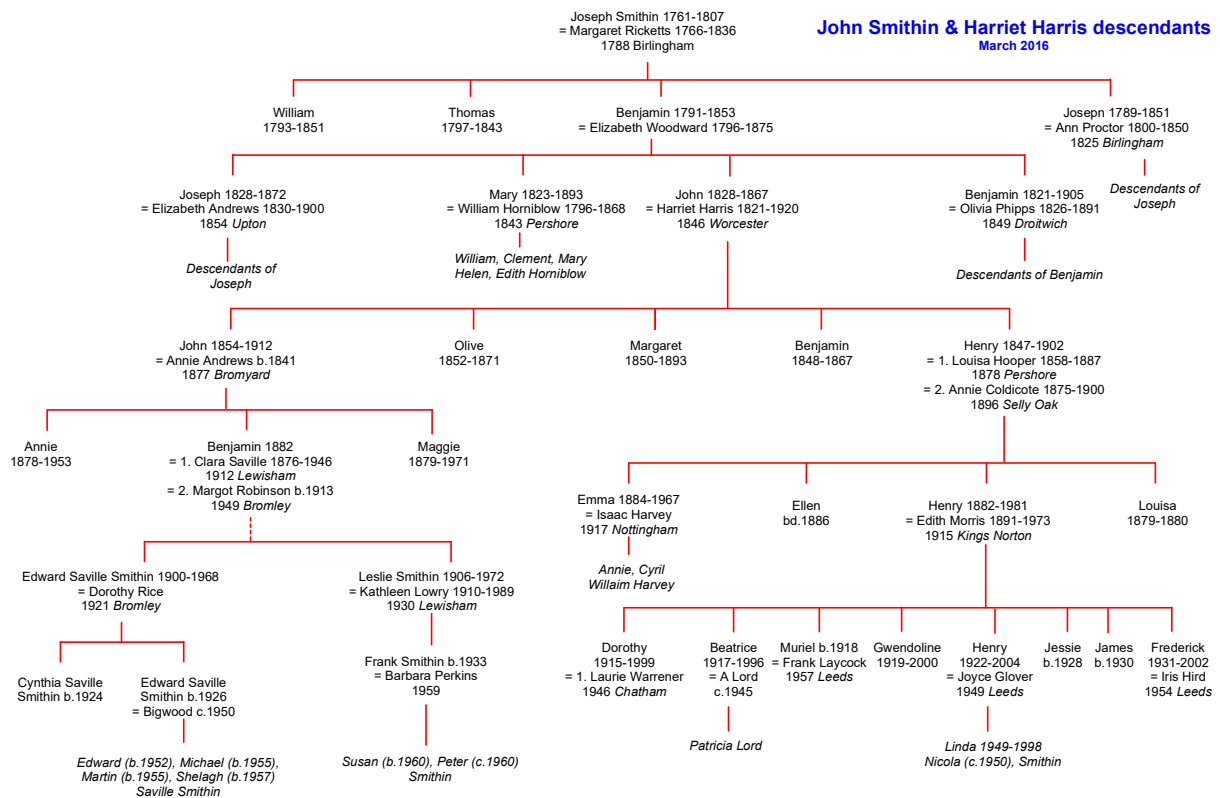
